PASTORAL REFLECTION

Dear Central Families:

A Glorious Future for the Saints

"The LORD is my shepherd; I shall not want. He makes me lie down in green pastures. He leads me beside still waters. He restores my soul. He leads me in paths of righteousness for his name's sake. Even though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I will fear no evil, for you are with me; your rod and your staff, they comfort me. You prepare a table before me in the presence of my enemies; you anoint my head with oil; my cup overflows. Surely goodness and mercy shall follow me all the days of my life, and I shall dwell in the house of the LORD forever" (Psalm 23:1-6).

The burden of proof rests upon us, based on our simple faith in the Lamb of God, even Christ. Notice in the 23rd Psalm the *Glorious Prospect* that is yours in verse 6 – *Goodness and Mercy* for all the days of your life down here, and then—in the King's palace forever. That's awesome! And If you can say "The Lord is my Shepherd; I shall not want" (vs.1), you can confidently sum up that: beneath you is "green pastures"; beside you to drink is the "still waters"; with you, is a "*dependable Shepherd*"; before you, "a table of feast with abundance" and around you may be many "enemies", but don't let that bother you if your focus is on the Shepherd. Notice that upon you is the *anointing of the Lord*, that means *you are special*, set aside for service—here and in the kingdom of your King. And after your pilgrim journey, "*goodness and mercy shall follow you* all the days of your life and beyond in the "House of the Lord." Don't let this blessing pass you! Now, how about this, "*The ransomed of the LORD shall return and come to Zion (heavenly Jerusalem) with singing; everlasting joy shall be upon their heads; they shall obtain gladness and joy, and sorrow and sighing shall flee away." (Isaiah 35:10).*

Our prayer then: "Lord, when the saints are marching in, let me be in the number."
